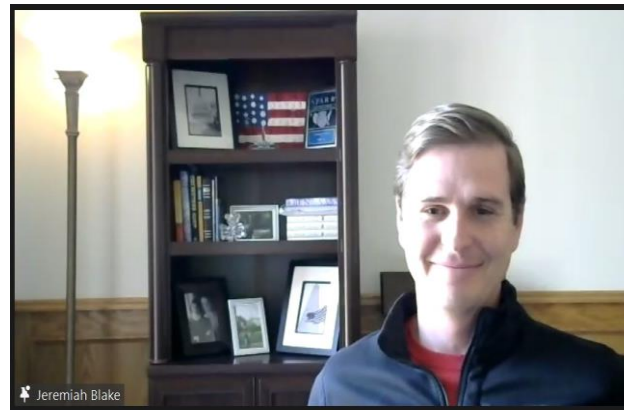

#### South Rotary supports student's dream with donation

The Rotary International theme for the 2021-22 Rotary Year is "Serve to Change Lives." That is what Lincoln South Rotary Club President DeEtta Vrana set out to do after reading the Lincoln Journal Star article about Lincoln High School senior Zaineb Aljumayaat, who competed in a national competition to create a prom dress out of duct tape.

"I was so impressed with the creativity and determination of this 18-year-old," Vrana said.

The design was based on the Shikh Zayed mosque in Abu Dhabi and honors her Middle Eastern culture. She received 14 rolls of duct tape in seven colors and invested 152 hours of hard work, creativity, frustration and tears. Encouraged by her sister, Shahad, she completed the spectacular duct tape dress, purse, shoes and headpiece.

Vrana learned that it was Zaineb's dream to attend the Rhode Island School of Design, but funding was a concern. The wheels were set in motion. Vrana was able to get support for a \$1,000 award from Roper & Sons Funeral Home Vice President Dean Schneider, and she had the support of the Lincoln South Rotary Club Board to put the club name on the project. With the help of fellow Rotarian and retired Lincoln High Principal Mike Wortman and Nicole Barnes, counselor in Lincoln High's International Baccalaureate Program, she connected with Zaineb.

Zaineb said, "As difficult as this contest was, it gave me the opportunity to meet wonderful people such as the members of the Lincoln South Rotary Club,

who chose to help me and listen to my story."

Lincoln South Rotary Club members, besides Vrana, met with Zaineb and were equally impressed with more than her project.

The board members noted the integrity and character of Zaineb and felt that she was insightful in her views

of our environment and cultures, believing in oneself and pursuing a dream.

"Zaineb has an important message for the next generations - using our planet's resources wisely, and taking lessons from many indigenous cultures

of how they live a happy life through sharing and not through possessions," said Lincoln South Rotary

board member Suni Kabishtia. "She wants to make sure the next generations and society think

about the 'give and get' culture; not only learning how to preserve our planet's limited resources but

how to be happy with what

we have."

Board member Mary Gilbride said she was impressed with Zaineb's maturity, and also felt privileged to meet her sister, Shahad, whose loving support for and admiration of Zaineb inspired and delighted all of the board members.

"We read about young people today not maturing until they are well into their 20s, but when I had the pleasure of interviewing Zaineb, I met someone more mature than her age," said Chan Tyrrell, South Rotary board member and past president. "The journey she is on will take her far in life and should be an inspiration to each of us."

As Zaineb was presented with the \$1,000 check at a recent Rotary Club meeting, she said, "I am so grateful for this money. For me, this gift is life changing and will allow me to attend college comfortably. Thank you, Lincoln South Rotary Club."

Donated labor, funds from Kiwanis, Optimists, Rotary create new ramp at The HUB

Installation of a new ramp at The HUB neared completion when volunteer workers from Lincoln Center Kiwanis Club and Lincoln Sunrise Optimist Club joined employees from Decks Unlimited for four hours of work on a cold January morning at 12th and D streets.

The ramp is used equipment that Kiwanian Mark Zeller had spotted in Kansas City. Zeller was able to get the ramp donated by disassembling and removing it.

"Our previous ramp was not really safe, especially in the winter or stormy weather, and was steeper than what's allowed by code," said Rose Hood Buss, executive director of The HUB.

Decks Unlimited owner Dan Waters, a Lincoln Center Kiwanis member, arranged for the Kansas City-based company to ship the parts to his business. Decks Unlimited transported the parts to The HUB and provided several employees to help with the service project.

Hood Buss said the donations led to considerable savings. "To install a new ramp was quoted at \$10,000, without the cost of installation," she said. "Thanks to the donation of the ramp, financial support of the Lincoln South Rotary Club and other individual donors, and the installation volunteers, we were able to complete this project for \$3,300."

Also helping with the installation project were Steve Clements, Doug Garrison, Norm Helzer and Mike Kucera of the Lincoln Center Kiwanis Club, and Dave Emery and LeRoy Sievers of the Lincoln Sunrise Optimist Club.

The last section of ramp railing was scheduled to be delivered Jan. 17.

The HUB, created in 2003, provides support and access to services for young people transitioning into adulthood who are disconnected from their family and the community. About 600 young adults were served by The HUB in 2021.

### South Rotary donates 50 blankets to City Mission

Lincoln South Rotary Club learned of the need for blankets for People's City Mission (the Mission) guests from Michelle Orth, community relations director.

Every client that enters the Mission is provided with various items, including a blanket, which becomes their property. When they leave, they take their blanket with them.

"We have about 250 guests right now and anticipate that will go over 400 with the colder weather," Orth said.

The immediate need to provide blankets for their stock now, in preparation for the winter, was obvious to Lincoln South Rotary Club.

Under the leadership of Club Committee Chair Sue Merrill and Club President DeEtta Vrana, the members were intro-

duced to the blanket drive needs and goals, and were asked to help by donating new, adult twin-bed size blankets to the drive.

In total, 50 guests will benefit from the drive, because the club donated 50 blankets with an estimated value of \$1,650.

"This will go a long way to provide comfort and practical hope to our guests – to feel loved and safe," Orth said. "We are beyond thankful – it has been such a joy to work with Lincoln South Rotary Club on this project."

The donated blankets were presented Nov. 5 at the Lincoln South Rotary Club meeting.

"This project was so satisfying," said Merrill. "The overall effort was so beneficial to the People's City Mission and our club, knowing that we support our community needs."

Lincoln South Rotary Club recognizes the value of education. When the club learned that the Early Head Start program in Lincoln was expanding, club members looked into ways to help.

"We support this organization because we can be assured that our dollars are being put to good use," said DeEtta Vrana, South Rotary president. "Providing quality education at an early age will help these children grow and mature into successful adults."

The Early Head Start program collaborated with South Rotary to provide two multi-child strollers. The commercial-grade strollers are important to Early Head Start to ensure safe transport of children.

"In 2021, Community Action expanded its Early Head Start program to serve 72 additional infants and toddlers," said Heather Loughman, CEO. "With this expansion came a need for additional supplies to care for children. We are so grateful for Lincoln South Rotary Club members, whose generous support enabled us to purchase new strollers to have at our new center."

When asked about the need for expansion, Loughman responded, "In Lincoln, 75% of children under age 6 have all parents in the workforce. It is crucial to ensure families have access to quality care for their children to maintain economic stability. Through this expansion,

## South Rotary donation helps Georgia poor

Life in the rural areas of the country of Georgia is difficult. But with the pandemic, it became dire.

With socialization shut down, any means for side businesses such as selling fruit no longer existed. Economic conditions have forced young people to emigrate or move to the cities for employment. Although they send money home to their relatives as they are able, it has left elderly, especially the homebound, struggling and alone.

Residents in the rural areas, primarily older individuals, live in poverty. Many have little or no family support. They receive a pension from the state amounting to \$70 to \$86 (USD) per month depending on their age and the region they live in. They are virtually destitute.

The organization "Together for Real Changes" (TRC) was developed to support the needy with home visits, food and hygiene supplies. TRC, working closely with the local social service agencies, learned of the most critical situations in the Borjomi, Mestia and Racha regions of Georgia.

Ruta Casabianca, a member of the Rastavi International Rotary Club, connected with Lincoln South Rotary Club through member Tom Cardwell, past

president and past District 5650 governor, and shared the need and stories.

The TRC volunteers do what they can to not only take care of the individuals in these remote areas, but also give them hope. The visits are scheduled every two weeks. An important aspect of the visit is to ensure that the individuals know they are not forgotten.

During the visits, they do routine screenings for diabetes, oxygen level, blood pressure and

temperature. They have an oxygen tank with them in case they need to transport someone to the hospital. They provide cleaning supplies and food including rice, wheat, cooking oil, beans, sugar, tea and cookies.

Though the program focuses on the elderly, it is for anyone in need. There is one adult child who has been disabled with a brain injury since birth. She was very surprised with their visit because no one has been interested in her. She has little family

support, so mostly she is taken care of by neighbors who feed her and take her for walks. She showed her delight in having the opportunity to tell someone her story.

TRC members are stretching their funds as much as possible, but they are not able to visit as often as they would like. Prices of food and gas have been rising, adding to the challenges they face. Unfortunately, several of the initial beneficiaries have died, but there is a waiting list.

Lincoln South Rotary Club was able to provide \$2,000 in much-needed funds to help support these efforts. Bellevue Washington Rotary Club made a \$3,000 donation, and the Denver Southeast Rotary Club recently donated \$2,000. But Rotarian Casabianca is working with other Rotary clubs for support to prevent starvation among these remote residents.

The TRC organization, with the support of Rotarians around the world, is fulfilling the Rotary 2021-22 theme "Serve to Change Lives."

## Rotary clubs hold blood drive thru Sept. 30

Lincoln's four Rotary clubs, with a collective membership of about 380 men and women from all walks of life and professions, are joining together to answer the call for blood donations in the Lincoln community. And they need your help.

Nebraska Community Blood Bank (NCBB) is a nonprofit organization that has been connecting people and saving lives since 1968. NCBB relies on the local community to donate blood to help ensure a safe and stable blood supply is available to area hospitals and other partners. With operations in Nebraska and western Iowa, NCBB is a division of New York Blood Cen-

ters Enterprises, serving communities across the country.

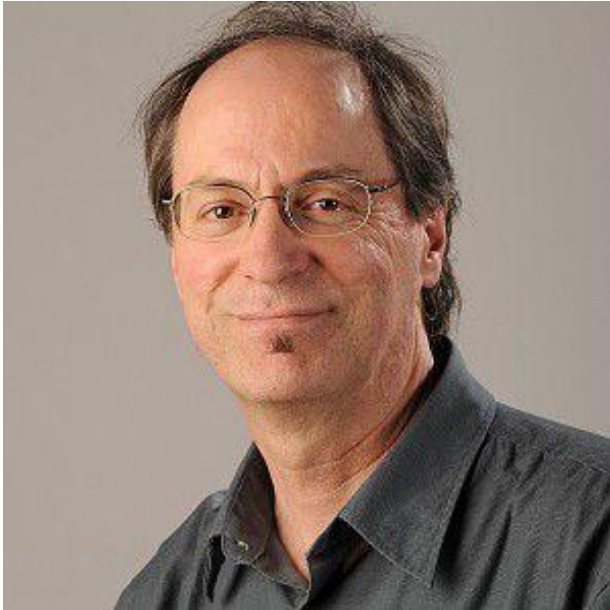
More than 50% of the blood supply was lost when community blood drives were canceled due to COVID-19 this past year, and the supply remains low. There have been days when less than a three-day supply of all blood types were available.

The Rotary club members are being motivated and encouraged to personally commit and get their spouses and adult family members to donate blood. This involves making their own appointments with the NCBB and donating by the end of September. You can join Rotary

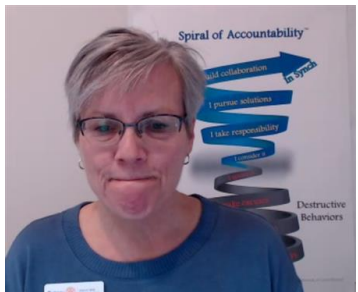
